Dinosaur Wow Day - How do we know about dinosaurs?

English

- RWI: exploring Set 2 and 3 sounds, developing fluency and comprehension with texts
- Refining letter formation, working on appropriate size and consistency
- Basic sentence structure and punctuation
- Reading and writing across a range of genres such as stories with familiar settings; labels, lists and captions; information texts; letters; funny or repetitive poems; pattern and rhyme
- Spelling review and consolidation of HFW spellings. Learn common exception words and explore alternative vowel phonemes.

Drama

- Participate in role play and small group improvisations
- Use voice, movement, and expression to show simple characters and moods
- Retell stories through drama, using beginning, middle, and end structure
- Work collaboratively, taking turns and listening to others' ideas
- Explore storytelling with props
- Begin to use freeze frames to capture a moment in a story

Philosophy

Through philosophical enquiry, pupils explore what it means to persevere when faced with challenges. They reflect on mistakes as opportunities for learning, consider why resilience matters, and practise supporting one another in dialogue and through stories.

PE & Games

- Fundamental movement skills with introduction of football and basketball
- Passing, dribbling, control and striking with the ball both in isolation and with team mates.
- Increasing confidence and improvement of water safety, stroke technique, speed and endurance in swimming

- Use atlases to locate the continents and oceans
- Name different countries within Europe
- Use atlases to locate different countries within Europe

How you can support your child

English

- Read with your child for at least 10 minutes every day. When the children come to a word they do not recognise, encourage them to look for 'special friends' then 'Fred talk' the word before saying the word.
- Regularly practise the recognition of Read Write Inc set 1, 2 and 3 sounds when they have been introduced.
- Support your child when writing at home with correct letter formation, leaving finger spaces, full stops and capital letters.
- Encourage your child to use the correct formation when writing numbers.

Maths

- Please encourage your child to use the correct formation when writing numbers.
- Encourage your children to learn number bonds to 10 by heart.
- Encourage your children to solve simple addition and subtraction problem using resources to support them if necessary.

Science

• Go on walks identifying living and dead things by the way they look.

Philosophy

• This term the focus is on resilience which links in with our zones of regulation. Please use this question as a discussion topic: 'What happens when you keep trying at something, and what happens if you stop trying?'

PE

- Practise hopping and skipping at home and in the garden.
- Place items at 12, 3, 6 and 9 on an imaginary clock face and pick them up with same hand whilst balancing on two/one leg/s.
- Encourage your child to throw and catch a ball; see if they can bounce it to themself too.
- Practise dribbling a football, passing from one foot to the other.
