The Power for Good: Reception's Superhero Mission Against Bullying

Reception had an exciting Anti-Bullying Week inspired by Supertato by author Sue Hendra. When the mischievous Evil Pea character from the story escaped, the children used this year's Anti-Bullying theme, The Power for Good, to work together and stop his tricks.

Through creative learning, the children designed superhero costumes and masks, wrote about the characteristics that make a good superhero, and even made a jelly trap to catch the Evil Pea!

In maths, the children explored the composition of number to 10 by adding numbers together to trap multilink peas under a bucket and used their "superpowers" to split numbers in different ways.

The children also explored kindness and making good choices through a moral dilemma: should they rescue the Evil Pea from the jelly? Using speech bubbles, they imagined what the Evil Pea might say when caught.

The week ended with a fantastic superhero dress-up day, celebrating friendship, teamwork, and using their Windlesham Values to make the world a kinder place.

Year 1 – Where in the World

This half term, our topic was 'Where in the World', and the children have been on an exciting journey to learn about our planet. They have explored the seven continents, discovered their names, and learned where each one is located on a world map. 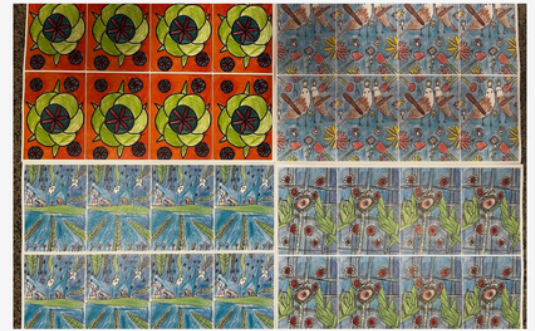


School Activities

From William Morris to Viking Trade – Year 3's Busy Half Term

Year 3 have had a busy and exciting half term.

In Art, the children explored Cubism, creating their own imaginative faces inspired by Picasso's The Weeping Woman. They also completed their study of William Morris, producing beautiful repeating wallpaper designs. Check out some of these outside Year 3 class on the display board!



The class took part in five Pedestrian Training sessions, learning about car lights, seatbelt safety, and how to cross roads safely — including why parked cars can be dangerous and why the quickest route isn't always the safest. So they should now all be really safe pedestrians, keeping themselves and others safe.

We were pleased to welcome Mr Morrin, who taught us about Viking trade and money, bringing our history learning to life. These experiences mean so much to our children and added a whole new level of depth to the topic.

The children also enjoyed working with their Year 2 Buddies, testing out the paper aeroplane instructions they had written in English.

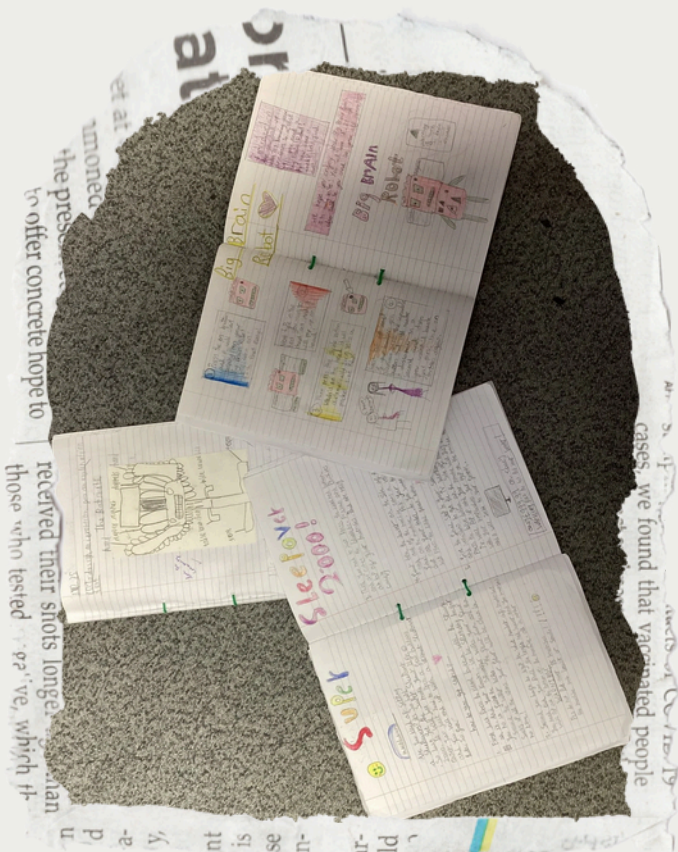

We believe in the importance of problem solving as a means of helping pupils develop their reasoning skills.

Year 5 pupils embraced The Primary Maths Challenge 2025. A huge well done to all who took part. Certificate were awarded to the following pupils.

Thomas scored a well-deserved 22 points out of 25 Gold Certificate. I await to hear if this qualifies him for the Bonus Round in February 2026.

Year 6 Art: Activism Project

This term, Year 6 explored how art can be a powerful tool for activism. They studied artists who use creativity to champion causes and communicate important messages, focusing on Luba Lukova's striking poster designs.

Pupils reflected on issues they care about through a "Find Your Message" activity, considering questions like What do you care about? and What is your message to the world?

This reflective activity helped pupils explore their identities, articulate their beliefs, and develop confidence in expressing their own viewpoints.

Inspired by these ideas, they created their own activist 'Zines' using collage, photocopying, and mixed media. They experimented with bold imagery, text, and composition to communicate their chosen messages. The project encouraged pupils to express their beliefs and discover that art can inspire change and the results in their sketchbooks was superb.

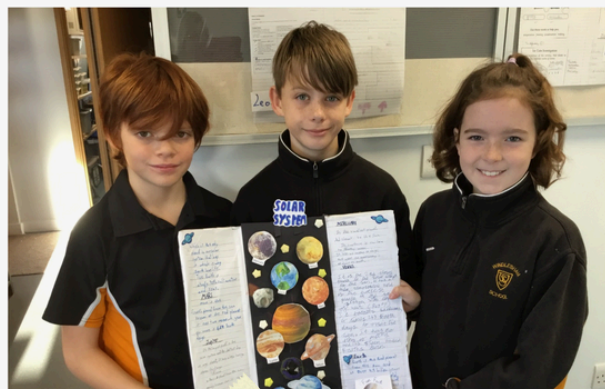
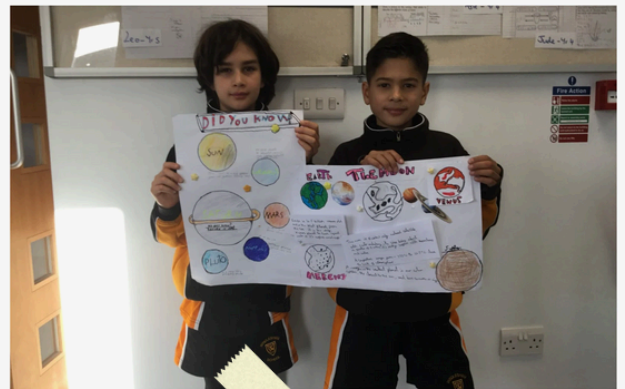
Science Spotlight Across the Year Groups

School Trips & Workshops

Year 6 Visit to Downs Air Raid Shelter

Year 6 had an unforgettable experience exploring our local air raid shelter as part of their World War II history unit. The visit gave pupils a real sense of what life was like during the Blitz and how people coped with the challenges of wartime Britain.

Inside the shelter, children saw the cramped conditions where children would have spent long hours during air raids. They learned about the importance of rationing, the role of gas masks, and even experienced an air raid! Our guides shared fascinating stories about how communities pulled together and stayed resilient during difficult times. We are incredibly lucky to have this historic air raid shelter right here in our community. It offers a unique opportunity for pupils to step back in time and experience local history.

The visit really brought history to life, helping pupils understand the courage and resourcefulness of those who lived through the war. A big thank you to the volunteers at the shelter for making the day so engaging and memorable! Some of which had strong connections to Windlesham. David Pierce sent both his daughters to Windlesham 40+ years ago and Miles Bingham was a Windlesham Head boy himself!

Year 6 Zoom Workshop on World War II

Year 6 also took part in an exciting online workshop all about World War II. The session was delivered via Zoom by a specialist history educator, bringing the past to life in a truly interactive way.

During the workshop, pupils explored key themes such as life on the Home Front, evacuation, rationing, and the role of propaganda. They had the chance to see real wartime artefacts on camera, including gas masks, ration books, and identity cards, and learned how these items were used during the war. The presenter shared fascinating stories and answered lots of thoughtful questions from our pupils.

The virtual format meant that children could engage with history in a dynamic way, even from the classroom. It was a fantastic opportunity to deepen their understanding of the challenges and resilience shown by people during the war.

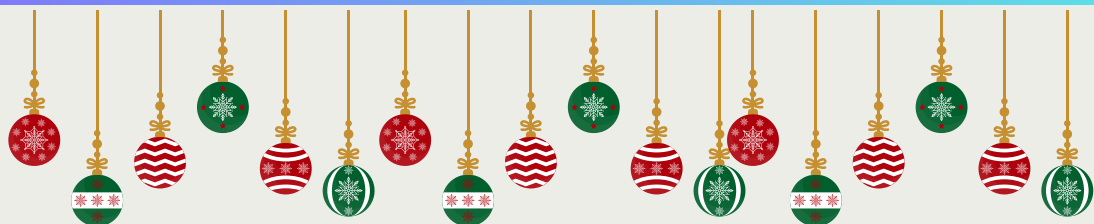
All pupils showed great sportsmanship and teamwork throughout so a huge well done to everyone involved.
